Publications on Display

The three glass display cases just inside the main doors to the Law Library and Technology Center (LLTC) were purchased recently to house one copy of each faculty publication in the law library collection. These publications were formerly kept in the cases by the library administration offices in the back of the library. At least one additional copy of each faculty publication is kept in the library general collection.

Each of the three display cases has four glass sides for better visibility of the publications. Published articles, generally in reprinted format, are kept by date in pamphlet cases in the display to the right as you enter the library.

The Faculty Bibliographies

A bibliography of faculty publications (1974-2000), compiled by Lisa Smith-Butler and edited by Gail Levin Richmond, is kept in the reserve section of the law library behind the circulation desk. The call number is KF 292.N68 S65 2000. A supplement to the main volume is currently being compiled and will soon be available. Current faculty publications are published monthly in the BOOK DOCKET, now edited by Deborah McGovern.

You can also find a list of the cataloged Law Faculty publications by going into NovaCat, the LLTC online catalog. You should click on *Featured Items* at the top right on the *Welcome to NovaCat* page, then click on number five, *Law Faculty Publications*, in the list of *Featured Items*. You can then click on individual items for cataloging information, which includes number of copies, publication dates, call numbers, supplements, and location in the law library and other NSU libraries.

To have your publications included in the display and the bibliographies, please notify the librarians of books, tapes, or other materials that are being published and

need to be purchased for the library collection. Faculty members are requested to send a reprinted copy of their published articles to the library so that they may be included in the display. If reprints are unavailable, please send one of the librarians the citation so that a copy can be printed from one of the online services.

Book of the Month: PRIVACY AT RISK: THE NEW GOVERNMENT SURVEILLANCE AND THE FOURTH AMENDMENT

This book considers the threat that newly developed surveillance technologies and increasingly powerful computer software pose to Americans' personal and social privacy. Professor Slobogin considers first, physical surveillance and second, transaction surveillance. He argues that judicial protection of privacy has been hampered by a restrictive construction of the Fourth Amendment's guarantee of "(t)he right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures." As new surveillance and data-mining capabilities have been placed in the hands of law enforcement agencies resolved to use them, legal protection of privacy has not kept pace.

In a chapter somewhat whimsically titled *Public Privacy*, Slobogin demonstrates how pervasive routine government surveillance has become. He instances the intrusion of CCTV into the public spaces of our cities. Twenty-four hour surveillance of public places threatens what a plurality of Justices in *Chicago v. Morales* referred to as "the freedom to loiter for innocent purposes."

Under the heading of transaction surveillance, the author examines FBI contracts with commercial data brokers, and the practice of data-mining.

Slobogin maintains that a return to the reasoning of the line of Fourth Amendment cases which began with *Katz v. United States* is necessary to make sure that government surveillance of citizens does not grow in lockstep with the increasing power and sophistication of surveillance techniques.

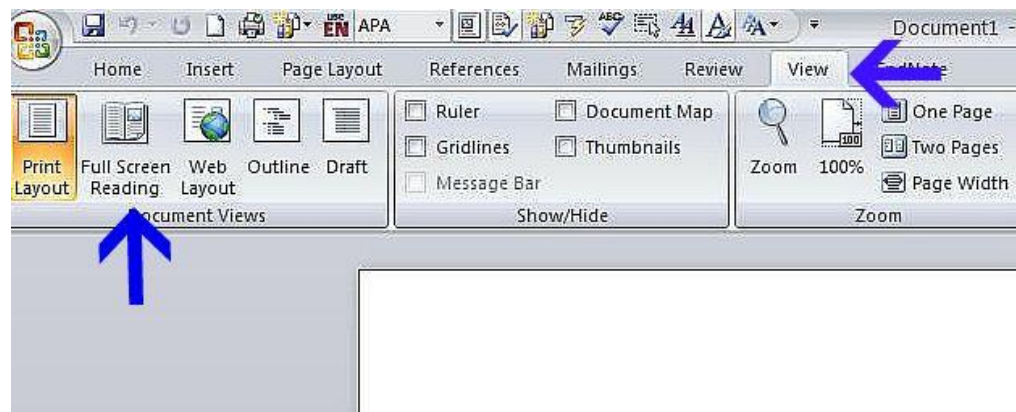

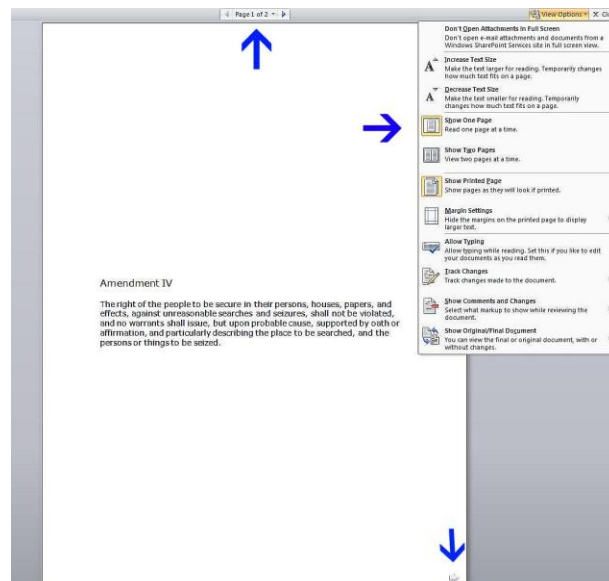

Tech Tip of the Month:

Would you like to get a closer look at your Word document? For more comfortable reading in Word 2007, without the distraction of toolbars, click on View, and under Document Views (the first group on the right), Select Full Screen Reading.



You can page through the document with the arrows located at the top of the screen, or those that appear in gray on the bottom of each page.



On the upper right of the screen in Full Screen Reading view is an item called View Options. Here, you can choose to increase or decrease text size, show one or two pages onscreen at a time, or allow typing, so that you can make corrections as you read. When you are finished reading, and want to return to Print Layout view, click on the Close button in the upper right corner of the page.

He spoke on the topic of “Deconstructing Humor: Why We Laugh,” at the Fifth Annual Paul R Joseph Memorial Colloquium.


